Red Wings find teeth to hold off Canucks

Third game in a row Detroit has given up a goal on first shot

DETROIT — Andreas Lilja was cut, bleeding and broken (at least one tooth was). But what happened next was about as good of an analogy for one team's performance in a game as you could find.

The puck came to Lilja as he argued with the referee. His quick pass led to a Jiri Hudler goal, part of the Detroit Red Wings' 6-5 victory over the Vancouver Canucks, Thursday night, at Joe Louis Arena.

The Red Wings took some blows. Goalie Chris Osgood let

in a goal on the first shot he faced — the third consecutive game that the Red Wings have done that. It was the fifth straight game that Detroit had given up the first goal. The Wings had a hard time finding the net with their shots, missing the mark 26 times. And a three-goal third-period lead quickly evaporated when Vancouver scored two

goals in the final 11:40 of the game.

The Wings were wounded. But they found success.

"Tomorrow when I get up in the morning and I look in the paper, it's going to be beautiful," said Detroit coach Mike Babcock.

Halfway through the first period with the score tied, 1-1, Lilja took a high stick that eventually required stitches to close a gash in his lip. Lilja, a rare NHLer who has never worn a mouth guard, also lost part of a tooth for the first time in his life.

But as Lilja shouted for a penalty to be called, he found a loose puck

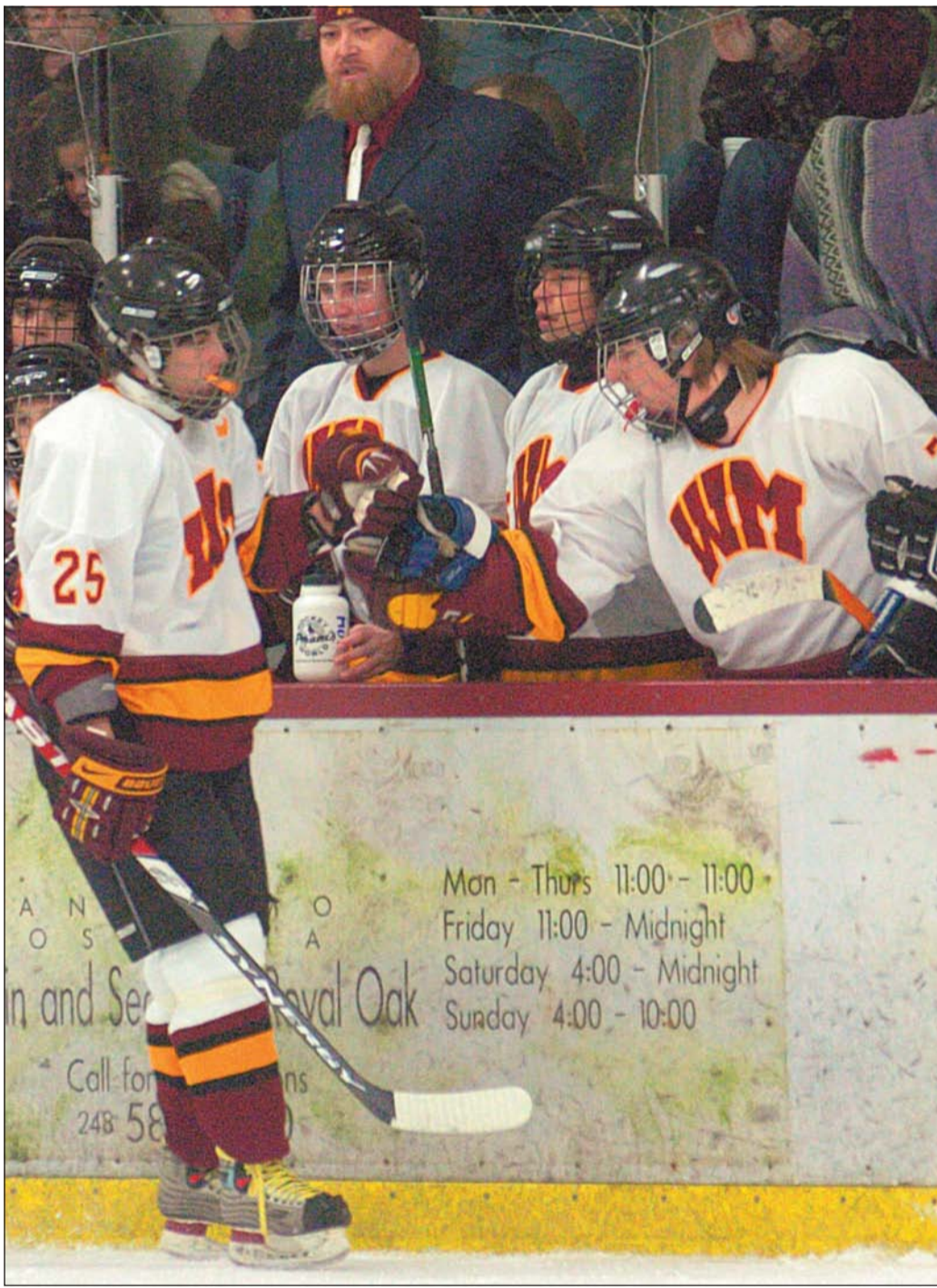
There is nothing like an early-season win to get those spirits bubbling like an over-enthusiastic bottle of Mountain Dew soda pop.

Lions expecting to see Williamsses in lineup

'We can't control any of that,' Marinelli says

ALLEN PARK — While the suspensions of Vikings defensive tackles Pat and Kevin Williams continue to work their way through the court system, the Lions are preparing as if both will be on the field Sunday.

The players were suspended four games each earlier this week for testing positive for a banned diuretic. A Minneapolis judge granted a temporary restraining order Wednesday allowing them to play this week end at Ford Field, but the NFL is seeking to have that ruling overturned in federal court.

According to the Minneapolis Star Tribune, the Williamses — they are not related — face a 10:30 a.m. hearing today that will determine their availability for Sunday.

Additionally, the NFL Players Association filed a separate lawsuit Thursday on behalf of the Williamses and three other suspended players seeking to overturn their punishment. That

hearing also is scheduled for today.

"We can't control any of that," Lions coach Rod Marinelli said. "All I know is we got to go practice good and whoever shows up for their team, we have to play them. And we know they're great players."

If the Williamses cannot play, Minnesota, 7-5 and in first place in the NFC North, likely will

start Ellis Wyms and Fred Evans at defensive tackle. The Williamses are Pro Bowlers who have 9 1/2 combined sacks (Kevin had

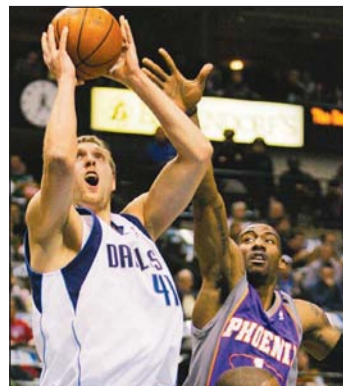
