Detroit rallies in OT as Flames' No. 1 goalie takes night off

DETROIT — Seeing isn't just believing. Seeing is believing you can stop a hockey puck.

But take away that sightline and now you've got a chance against an NHL goalie.

"They're all too good," said Detroit

coach Mike Babcock. "They stop the puck if they can see it. Sometimes if you try to skill yourself around the rink, you don't have that. If you're going to win in today's NHL, you have to have people around the net and you've got to get the puck there on a continual basis."

Anchor Bay edges Richmond

Tars build big lead, hang on for 36-32 triumph

Anchor Bay's wrestling team got off to a very quick start in its match with Richmond Wednesday night.

And 285-pounder Dave Vanoverbek was there to keep things going.

Vanoverbek pinned the Blue Devils' Josh Younk just 35 seconds into the second period to build the Tars advantage to 23-0 after four matches. From there, Anchor Bay was able to hold on for a 36-32 win in a match between the only two state-ranked teams in Macomb County.

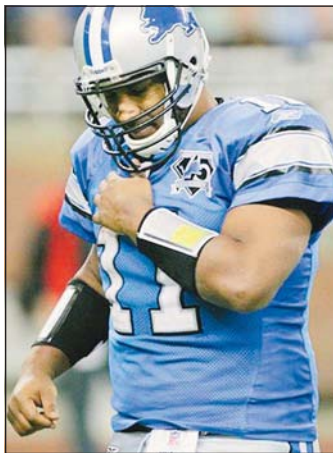
"I did everything I needed to do," said Vanoverbek, a junior. "I just tried my hardest and did what I could."

Vanoverbek got a quick take-down to begin the match and almost immediately turned Younk to his back to score a three-point nearfall. Younk fought back to get a reversal with 10 seconds left in the opening period and then turned the Tars' heavyweight to his back to get a two-point nearfall before the period ended.

Orlovsky may start vs. Colts

QB says 'he can go out and play well'

ALLEN PARK — With Daunte Culpepper "more doubtful than probable" because of a shoulder injury, the Lions are ready to turn their starting quarterback job over to Dan Orlovsky again.

Orlovsky practiced Wednesday for the first time since he suffered ligament damage and two fractures in his throwing thumb Nov. 2 at Chicago. He said he felt better than he has at any point in the last month and should be ready to play Sunday at Indianapolis.

"I told (the coaching staff) that I was going to go out there today and see how it felt and if I felt that I can go out and play on Sunday effectively, I would go, and if I didn't, I wasn't going to be stupid and push it," Orlovsky said. "And after today I feel I can go out and play well on Sunday."

"It's easy for me to sit there and throw routes, but to know that in the fourth quarter I'm going to get hit in the chin and have to make a throw, that's what I wanted to know if I'm going to be able to do. And I think I will."

Team turnaround: Eisenhower soars back

It was a mere three years ago that Eisenhower hockey was among the state's most respected programs.

During the 2005-06 season, the Eagles shared the Macomb Area Conference Red Division title, garnered its first state ranking, won a regional championship and advanced to the state semifinals. The team was on a roll, building tradition with every ice-crunching stride.

However, almost as quickly as they'd soared to the top, the Eagles came crashing back down.

The 2006-07 season saw the team diminished to a shell of its former self. Ike came away with just one win on the year,

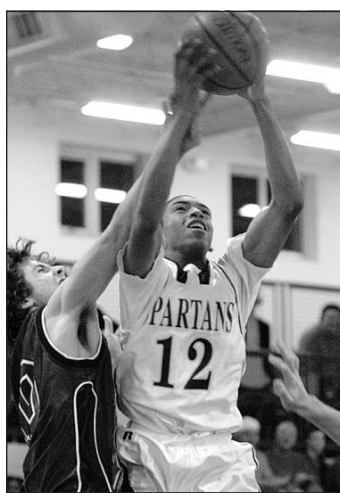

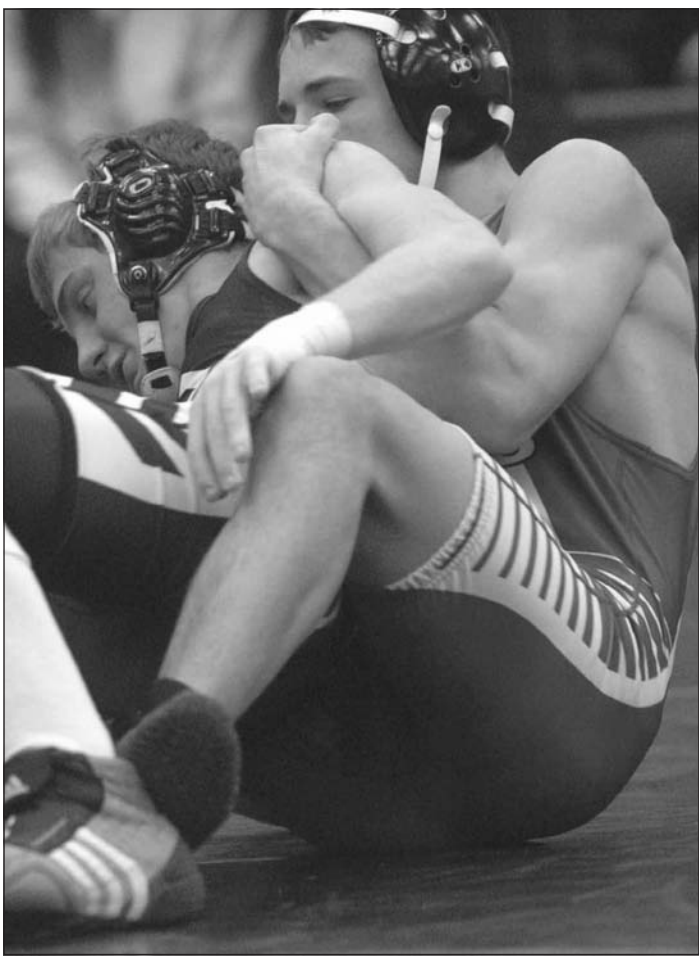
Has Barack Obama named his secretary of defense yet? If not, South Lake coach Matt Ferguson might have some suggestions.

that's what would happen. Here at Richmond, we don't win that way.

"They out-wrestled us because they're more experienced than we are," added Hamblin, who starts five freshmen. "But when I look deep down inside I'm smiling. These young kids battled with that senior-dominated team."

spectrum of people contributing and we have four really solid lines."

Like their counterparts over at Dakota, Persha and his teammates endure the strain of early-morning skates. Every Monday and Friday, the team gathers before sunrise at Suburban Ice Macomb for practice - which begins promptly at 5:25 a.m. Persha believes the grueling schedule requires a lot of discipline that

can bring a team closer together. He lives a bit further away from the rink than the rest of his teammates, who can get away with cutting it close.

"Getting up for them is pretty hard, but once I'm on the ice it wakes me up," Persha said. "That way, I don't ever fall asleep in school. Most of the guys have to get up at five. I live on Hall Road, so I have to be up a little earlier. I think the more we do this, the better and better we're getting."

The coach sees the attitude of the team's leaders permeating the entire roster. He depends equally on Persha - the outgoing, talkative type and Maloney - who is used to leading by example. Hall also gets a lot of help from alternate captains Warner and James Czarnik.

"Those are all the guys that lead this team into battle," Hall said. "They're determined to put Ike hockey back on the map and get it back to where it used to be. Right now there's a respect for the program. The kids are buying in and they want to make this a top-notch team again."
