While teams line up for No. 1, playoff debate heats up

No. 1 Oklahoma plays No. 2 Florida tonight

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Bob Stoops posed next to the crystal football and played along with a wave of photographers.

They asked him to look to the left, he did. They asked him to smile, he did. Any shot they wanted Wednesday inside a hotel ballroom, he gave them.

Then a shutterbug shouted to the Oklahoma coach, telling him to hold up his finger, showing who's No. 1. Stoops tilted his head, stared at the guy and kept his hands still.

"Too soon," he said.

First, there's a game to play. The hurry-up Sooners and speedy Florida meet tonight for the BCS championship, a matchup that includes a pair of Heisman Trophy winners, an SEC vs. Big 12 debate and more than its share of trash talk.

Besides, enough teams already are claiming the top spot. Southern California, Utah and Texas hope their bowl wins impressed enough voters in The Associated Press poll, which will be released in the wee hours Friday.

Heck, how about New Hampshire? The Wildcats beat Army,

which beat Louisiana Tech, which beat Mississippi State, which beat Vanderbilt, which beat Mississippi, which handed the No. 1 Gators their only loss.

No wonder college fans from President-elect Barack Obama on down want to see a playoff system.

"I think at some point in time it might happen," Florida coach Urban Meyer said Wednesday. "I didn't believe that a few years ago, but I feel now the discussion is out of control. I can't imagine any guy that enjoys football not discussing that wherever he's at. So I imagine at some point that might happen now."

As to whether it should be a tournament for four, eight or 16 teams, that's someone else's department.

"It's not my job to figure that out," Meyer said. "I think it would be hard. I don't know how you do it."

Echoed Stoops: "That's not for me to do. They're all good football teams; everyone realizes that. So again, that's for you guys to choose."

There's plenty of time to think about it. The BCS' latest TV deal with ESPN ensures there won't be a playoff until at least 2014.

Meanwhile, there's a pretty attractive game brewing at Dolphin Stadium between 12-1 teams.

Tim Tebow was a freshman two years ago, backing up Chris

Leak when the Gators stomped Ohio State for the national championship. Tebow won the Heisman last season and now will try to add a second title.

The Rambo-style quarterback will soon explore his NFL options, deciding whether to enter the draft or return for his senior season. Tebow is not exactly elegant with his left-handed tosses, and some scouts project he'll wind up as a tight end in the pros.

"I'll hear something about Tim's throwing motion or the NFL is looking for — I sometimes get confused," Meyer said.

Cougars' D stifles CV

However, 'we need wholesale changes on offense,' Dakota coach Bill Snyder says

Dakota's basketball team made coach Bill Snyder happy to a point in the first half of its Macomb Area Conference Red Division opener with Chippewa Valley.

The second half, however, brought an even bigger smile to the face of the Cougars' coach.

"I think the speech was very similar in both locker rooms at halftime," Snyder said after Dakota's 46-29 victory.

"We need to pick up our offense, but thank goodness we played some good defense. It's 16-15. On one hand, you're pleased with your defense and not making a whole lot of corrections there, but you need some wholesale changes on offense."

The offensive adjustments paid immediate dividends for the Cougars. They scored the first six points of the second half to open a 22-15 lead. Chippewa Valley answered with a pair of

baskets to cut the margin back to three points, but Dakota finished the third quarter with a 7-3 run. That made it 29-22 going into the fourth quarter and the Cougars just kept padding their lead.

"We don't have an experienced team and when we got down we couldn't remember how to come back," said Big Reds coach Kevin Voss. "We didn't buckle up and try to get that one stop. Everybody was trying to make a play to get us back. Hopefully, we learned something."

Dakota, which made four three-point baskets in the first quarter to lead 12-10, got a pair of triples from sophomore Mark Morris early in the final quarter to make it 37-24 with just under six minutes to play.

"That's not our offense," Snyder said. "You'd like to have some 3-pointers, but you want to mix in some other baskets."

That's what the Cougars did in the second half.

"We talked about how we were standing around in the first half and that we wanted to spread the floor a little more," Snyder said.

Anchor Bay looks to build tradition

When Daryl McCarrel became the coach of the Anchor Bay hockey team, he brought with him a list of accomplishments he hoped to achieve. Chief among those was to build tradition. While other schools statewide own a storied history — forged through countless games and battles therein — the Tars were a team with a cloudy identity. Knowing that it would take months, if not years, to build this tradition, McCarrel took the traits he believed would best serve the team and attempted to instill them in the players.

"We're trying to be the hardest-working team on the ice," McCarrel explained. "We want to win the battles up and down the ice, in the corners and with a good fore-check. I think we tried to do it last year, but we knew it would take four or five years to get it to kick in. The players are reaping the

benefits now from the previous years." The Tars managed strong showings as members of the MAC White Division, placing third in 2004-05 and second the following year. But 2006-07 saw Anchor Bay move up to the Red Division. They finished fifth that season and followed it up in sixth-place last year. While the record may not have been as strong as McCarrel and his staff had hoped, they were able to see that the infrastructure was beginning to solidify.

So, it could not have come as a total surprise that the Tars came out of the

gate on fire this year, winning five consecutive games to open the season. Anchor Bay gave up just six goals during that streak and scored 21. The group features 16 players that are either juniors or seniors and many of them are returnees from a year ago.

Though the season could hardly have started better, the Tars are not immune to the inevitable up-and-down of a long season. The proof: since starting 5-0, the team has dropped three straight games. Granted, they were close calls against L'Anse Creuse North — which leads the White Division — and a pair of historically strong programs in Notre Dame Prep and Port Huron Northern. Not that McCarrel is dismayed by any of this, though.

"We know there are going to be set-

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Michigan rallies to beat Hoosiers 72-66 in OT

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Indiana had Michigan on the ropes Wednesday night.

The Hoosiers just couldn't deliver the knockout punch.

Manny Harris, DeShawn Sims and Laval Lucas-Perry led Michigan back from a 20-point second-half deficit to force overtime, then took advantage of the weary Hoosiers to pull off an improbable 72-66 victory.

Lucas-Perry finished with 18 points, Harris, the Big Ten's top scorer, added 17 and Sims had 14 for the Wolverines (12-3, 2-1).

Indiana (5-9, 0-2) was led by Devan Dumes with 17 and Nick Williams with 14. But it wasn't enough to avoid a fifth straight loss, the Hoosiers' first three-game losing streak at Assembly Hall since December 2004 or their first 0-2 start in conference play since 1997-98.

Michigan's first win in Bloomington since 1995 even reminded fans of how Indiana blew another 20-point lead against Lipscomb on Dec. 28, the Hoosiers' last home game.

But this one didn't start that way. Indiana jumped to a 23-8 lead midway through the first half, extended the margin to 32-16 and still led 39-22 at the half. An early second-half scoring flurry gave

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Panthers ready to defend Gold title

Center Line opens up league with pair of wins

CLAWSON— The chance to defend its MAC Gold championship couldn't have come soon enough for Center Line coach Dave Anderson and his Panthers.

Last year's league champions got off to a perfect start Wednesday at Clawson

High School, breezing past the host Trojans and Madison to move to 2-0 in league action.

"Our school doesn't win too many league championships, so this is big for us," said Anderson, who returns seven seniors from last year's league winners. "Winning really helps with the program. When I started out four years ago we had nothing. I had no wrestlers. I had to start basically a brand new program.

"From where we were then to where we are now, it's impressive to me."

The Panthers looked impressive against the Trojans and Eagles. Center Line cruised past Madison 70-10 in the first match of the night. Ryan Laskie, Jacob Legree, Jared Horetski and Jason Legree all pinned their opponents.

Jeremy Jakushevich and Corey Kenny were the lone bright spots for the Eagles. Jakushevich (135 pounds) pinned the Panthers' Jacob O'Guin in 2:31 to give Madison six of its points. Kenny picked up a major decision (16-2) over Peter Locricchio at 215.

Center Line capped off its night with a 72-6 win over Clawson.

Legree was one of 10 Panthers to win two matches on the night. His brother Jacob, also won both matches, along with Horetski, Adam Cross, Brad Borts, Mike Tyszkiewicz, Pat Mack, Dan Nickles, Scott Gulette and Cullen Redmon.

Jason Palmer (103) beat Ryan Laskie 7-5 for one of Clawson's victories. At 125 pounds, Mike Francis beat Bryan Bailey 14-9.

Anderson knows winning a

league title won't be easy for his Panthers. He expects his team to have to contend with Lake Shore and Grosse Pointe South if it hopes to repeat.

Anderson said he also expects Lincoln to be a factor in the Gold. The Abes also picked up a pair of wins at the Clawson quad.

"You can never underestimate Lincoln because you just never know," Anderson said. "That's been our problem (against Lincoln) in the past. They've been able to pull something out of their hat against us."

The Abes were in the MAC Blue last year. They moved down two divisions in joining the Gold.

Coach Bill Delia's team defeated Clawson 48-13 and Madison 48-24 to move to 2-0 in league play. Bryan Jones, Ken Meadows, Michael Flaga, Matt Shelton and Keith Lynch all won both of their matches to help the Abes to the sweep.

"We should be able to compete (in the division)," said Delia. "We just have trouble keeping the kids around. Some of our best kids weren't here tonight because of various reasons. But I'm sure ev-

erybody that is down in numbers has that same problem.

"Center Line is probably the class of the division. And Grosse Pointe South has a pretty good team. But we should be able to compete."

Picking up Clawson's wins against Lincoln were Palmer (by void), Francis (major decision), Rod Grant (decision) and Kevin Cunningham (pin).

Madison's victories were by Will Logan (void), Jakushevich (pin), Tyler Matiyow (technical fall) and Kenny (pin).

backs," he said. "But, we're happy with the progression the kids are making. We're learning how to win. We're putting ourselves in good situations and all the games have been close. The kids are buying into the idea that saving a goal is just as important as scoring one."

The Tars face a broad set of challenges the rest of the season. They will face Saint Clair Shores and Utica in the upcoming MAC Showcase on Jan. 16 and 17. The very next weekend will find the team making the 350-mile trek north to Pullar Stadium in Sault Ste. Marie. There, the Tars will play in the Soo Lions Tournament against some of the Upper Peninsula's stiffest competition. Anchor Bay also earned an invite to the prestigious Trenton Invitational in mid-February. The tournament is known for including the very best high school teams from across the state. Utica and Saint Clair Shores are the county's other Trenton entrants. After all that, the team will jump right into the state playoffs.

McCarrel especially favors the showcase tournaments.

"We're real excited about the MAC Showcase," he said. "(Dakota's) Dave Koons has done a tremendous amount of work to organize it. It was also important for us to get invited to Trenton. The idea is to show the talent that this state has. We're seeing that junior clubs are finding high school players very complete."

McCarrel cited Justin Abdelkader, a former Mona Shores High School player who caught scouts' eyes at the Trenton tournament and subsequently made the journey to junior, collegiate and professional hockey as a Red Wings prospect.

"More and more guys are starting to get noticed at that tournament," McCarrel said. "I was there when they first started

and it has gone way past what we ever thought it could do."

While participating in showcase tournaments is extremely helpful for exposure and recruiting, most county teams are hoping to make their mark in the state tournament. The Tars are no exception. Anchor Bay has won four playoff games since its first appearance in the tournament in 2004-05. Last season the team dropped a 2-1 regional semifinal game against Stoney Creek. McCarrel and his staff are hoping that this year's group will be able to make a run.

Luckily, the Tars have been strongest where it counts — in goal and along the blue line.

"We're really happy with the goalies, Alan Gaglio and Jeremy Wierzbowski," he said. "We're also getting some goals from our defensemen. Our staff believes that if we can win a regional, anything can happen in a one-game elimination. We set the goals high, but we're going to stay focused."

By raising the bar and expecting more of themselves, the Tars can be proud.

They are creating their tradition with every shift.

"In the second half we went away from a patterned offense and went to a spread where we could move. We didn't want kids on the back side standing still. That's how we got into rebounding trouble with over the backs (fouls). We wanted those kids moving back and forth. I thought (the adjustment) made us a little sharper."

In addition to Morris, three other younger players made key contributions for Dakota in the second half.

"Deontae Rex did a great job guarding the ball," Snyder said. "Will Stone was an offensive threat every time he touched the ball on the wing and on the back side rebounding. Nigel Adams was playing great defense."

Six-foot-7 Matt Mullins led Dakota's balanced attack with 10 points. Morris had nine points and Stone scored eight.

Kevin Nikkel led Chippewa

Valley with nine points and Christian Fincher had seven points and eight rebounds. Glen McIntosh grabbed eight rebounds.

Voss was pleased with the Big Reds' play in the first half, but not as happy with the second half.

"The first half I thought we played well and accomplished what we were trying to accomplish," he said. "In the second half we didn't execute on offense very well and there were things we were trying to do on defense that we didn't get done. We didn't follow the game plan and stop this guy from getting this and that guy from getting that. It just kind of got away from us. We don't have the confidence and swagger of a team that's been in tough games, rivalry games. It's probably a good opener for us because this is a good introduction to what the MAC Red is like every night."

Snyder was just hoping that

his team wouldn't have a rivalry hangover when it plays Romeo on Friday.

"It's always fun to play them because the community gets into the game, and it's a good-natured rivalry," he said. "Kevin and I have a great deal of respect for each other and we're good friends but you always worry about the game you play after."

"It's an emotional couple days for the kids. The last thing we said to them was that we're challenging them to see how we are in practice tomorrow and to play with even greater effort on Friday."

'It was a little more exciting than I wanted it to be,' coach Nelson says

It's not often you can call a game with just one lead change a thriller but Wednesday night's MAC Silver basketball game between Center Line and Warren Woods-Tower was just that.

Center Line ended up winning 67-63 but not before giving back almost all of 21-point third-quarter lead.

"It was a little more exciting than I wanted it to be," Panthers' coach Jim Nelson said. "We just had problems with their pressure in the

third quarter. We did a fine job with it earlier in the game and then lost it a little in the third, but we got back on track."

Warren Woods-Tower led 14-9 after the first quarter thanks to eight points from senior Andrew Rumpz and 10 rebounds from sophomore Stephen Zannetti. For the game, Rumpz had 12 points and seven rebounds while Zannetti finished with nine points and 16 boards.

The Titans extended the lead to 16-9 when sophomore Jacob Warwinsky scored the first basket of the second quarter. It turned out to be the only points that Warren Woods-Tower would get in the period.

Warren Woods-Tower saw its record drop to 0-5 overall while Center Line improved to 1-4. Nelson is optimistic the first victory of the year can spur his team on to better things.

"I think so," he said. "We want to repeat and get that league championship again and this is the first step in doing that."
