## Final seconds tough on Eagles

Kettering takes 63-60 victory after key TO

It could have been worse for Parkway Christian. It could have happened in a state tournament basketball game.

The Eagles committed a turnover and were called for a bench technical foul with 7.3 seconds left in the fourth quarter and Detroit Kettering took advantage by going on to make three free throws that broke a 60-all tie and lifted the Pioneers to a 63-60 non-league boys game on Thursday night.

### Boys H.S. Basketball

Junior guard Nequan Tucker scored 17 points and senior guard Mark Whittsett 13 for Detroit Kettering, a Detroit Public School League team that has produced stars such as former Pistons Eric Money and former Michigan State standout Lindsay Hairston.

Zurlon Tipton scored 16 points and Matt Cooper 14 for Parkway Christian, which had a six-game winning streak snapped and lost for only the second time this season to drop to 16-2.

Parkway Christian coach Jim Barker scheduled the game against the

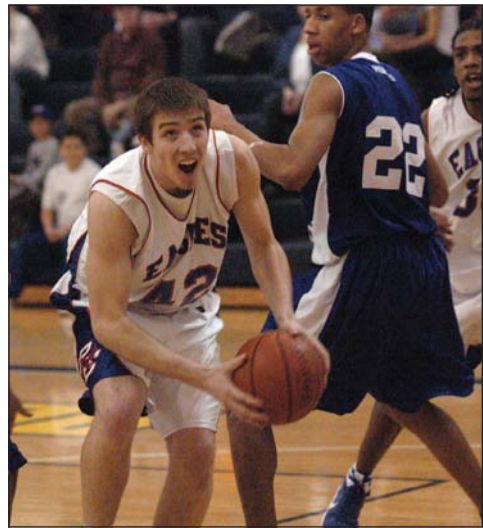
Pioneers because he thought it would toughen the Eagles for the Class D playoffs, which begin with district tournament games on March 9.

The Eagles, state semifinalists in 2007, led 18-13 after one quarter and were tied with the Class A Pioneers at halftime.

Parkway Christian led by a point entering the fourth quarter and, despite trailing by as many as four midway through the final stanza, led 60-58 on John Talos' baseline jumper with 1:21 to play.

But the Eagles would not score the

## Prep hockey squads eye successful tourney runs

Since they began participating in 2005, Macomb Area Conference hockey teams have been able to consistently turn in remarkable state playoff performances.

While some members of the league still are fighting for respect on a statewide basis, a closer look at post-season results reveals that the conference already has a lot on which to build.

In every season, at least one MAC team has advanced to the championship game in its region. Last year saw Dakota claim its first regional title, after defeating Troy Athens in overtime. The following is a look ahead at next week's state playoffs, from the perspective of teams in Macomb County:

### Division 1

At McMorran Arena Port Huron, March 2, 4  
Rochester Unified vs. Eisenhower; Lake Orion vs. Port Huron Northern

Last season, the Eagles were a downtrodden group that struggled most of the season. Drawing Dakota in the first round didn't help matters — the Cougars quickly dispatched Ike by a 5-1 score. This year's team looks 180 degrees different. As of press time, Eisenhower stood at 16-4-2 overall and were the White Division runners-up. While coach Bob Hall and the Eagles have come a long way in a rebuilding effort, another quick postseason exit may be on the horizon. Rochester Unified boasts one of the

## Woods' big comeback hits a snag

He likely be back though in 2 weeks at CA Championship

MARANA, Ariz. (AP) — One day after a ceremonious return to golf, Tiger Woods was on his way home.

Tim Clark of South Africa played 16 holes without a bogey and pulled ahead for good on the back nine Thursday, knocking Woods out of the Accenture Match Play Championship with a 4-and-2 victory.

Woods holed out a 50-foot bunker shot for birdie on the 14th hole and appeared to be making a run, but his tee shot on the 15th hole hit a cart path and went over a fence and out of bounds, costing him the hole.

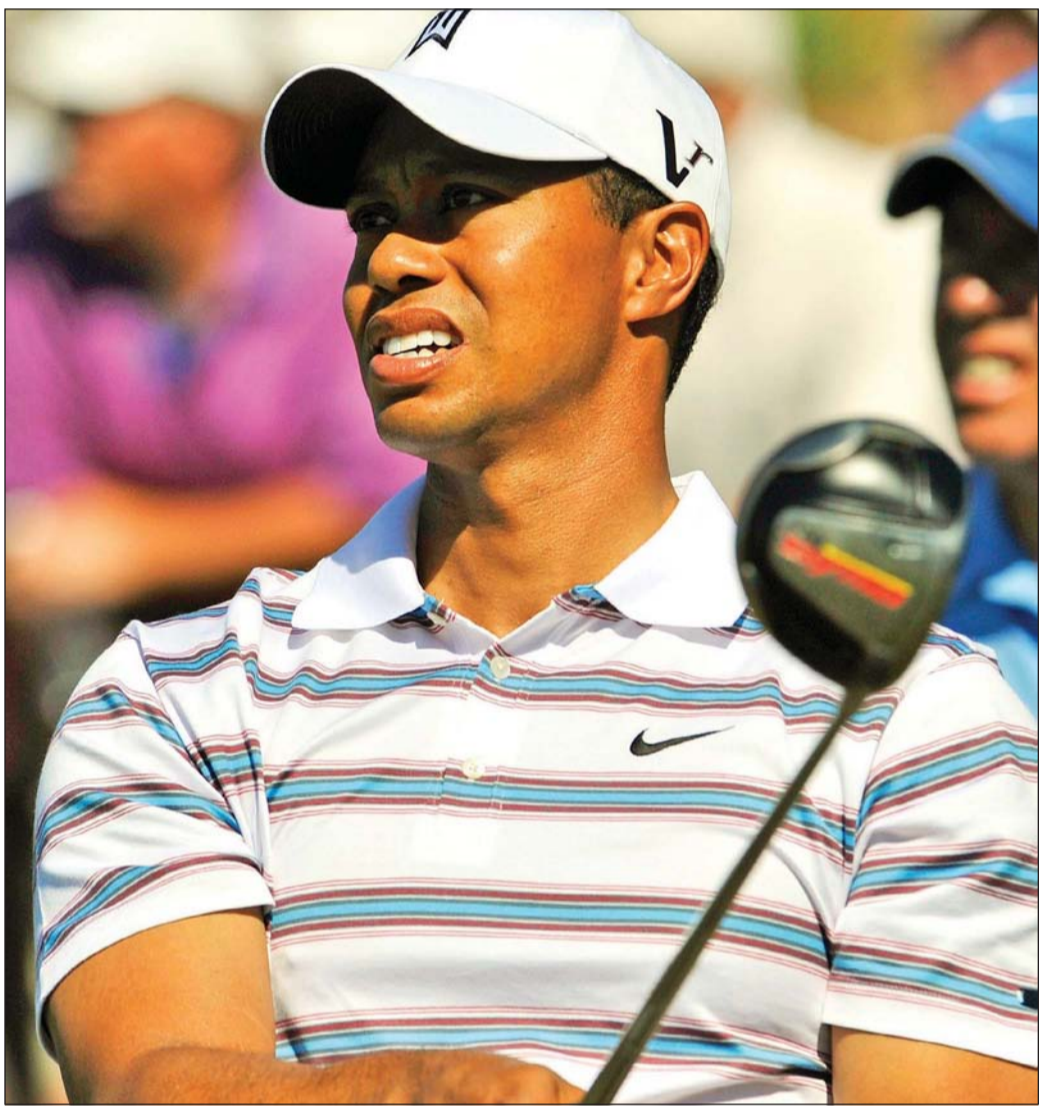
The good news for golf is that it probably won't have to wait eight months to see him again.

Woods likely will play in two weeks at Doral in the CA Championship, although he said he would wait to see how his left knee felt. This was his first tournament since reconstructive surgery on the knee one week after he won the U.S. Open in June.

Asked where he would go from here, Woods replied, "To the airport."

Clark, a pesky opponent with a sharp short game, didn't give him much of a chance. He was 6-under par when the match ended on the par-3 16th hole, where he put his tee shot 4 feet away. The putt was conceded when Woods failed to chip in from just off the

## Washington clips the Tigers, 2-1

Detroit's offseason acquisition Edwin Jackson strikes out 3, walks 1 in 2 innings

VIERA, Fla. (AP) — Collin Balester, Jordan Zimmermann and Terrill Young each pitched two scoreless innings and the Washington Nationals beat the Detroit Tigers 2-1 Thursday.

The 22-year-old Balester is the only of the trio with major league experience,

having started 15 games for the Nationals last year. He and Zimmermann are vying for spots in the rotation and Young is a Rule 5 draft pick

who must either make the team out of camp or be offered back to the Cincinnati Reds.

"I tried to be as calm as possible and not get too worked up, and I think that helps me," the 22-year-old Zimmermann said. "I wasn't nervous at all. I just got up there and did my thing."

Tigers starter Edwin Jackson struck out three and walked one in two innings.

The Nationals broke the scoreless tie in the third inning when Wil Nieves doubled off Nate Robertson, driving in Pete Orr.

Detroit tied it in the fifth when Cleve Thomas singled home Ryan Raburn. Washington scored in the bottom half as Chris Marrero doubled home Orr.

Mike O'Connor got the victory and Rick Porcello took the loss. Former Tiger Wil Ledezma and Jesus Colome finished up with a scoreless inning apiece for the Nationals.

## Michigan stuns No. 16 Purdue

ANN ARBOR (AP) — DeShawn Sims scored a career-high 29 points and Manny Harris had 27 points and eight rebounds to lead Michigan to an 87-78 victory over No. 16 Purdue on Thursday night.

The Wolverines (18-11, 8-8 Big Ten) improved to 3-4 against ranked opponents and added an important victory to the ones it had over Duke and UCLA, when both teams were ranked fourth in the nation. Michigan is trying for its first NCAA tournament bid in more than a decade.

Robbie Hummel scored 24 points for the Boilermakers (21-7, 10-5), while E'Twaun Moore had 18.

Purdue, which had won four straight, fell two games behind Big Ten-leading Michigan State and a half-game behind Illinois.

The Boilermakers trailed by three midway through the second half, but couldn't stop Sims or Harris during a 19-6 run that decided the game.

The Wolverines haven't earned an NCAA tournament bid since 1998, but they've got a shot to end the drought with two talented upperclassmen — Sims and Harris — recruited by former coach Tommy Amaker, gutsy freshmen and savvy coaching by John Beilein, who is in his second season.

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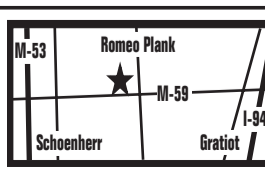

## Abes rake in the Gold

Lincoln clinches share of league championship after defeating Mount Clemens

Coach Jeff McGavin and his basketball players from Lincoln have the makings of some might savvy investors.

For a few years, they profited in Silver. On Thursday night, they cashed in on the Gold market. The Abes' 70-57 victory over visiting Mount Clemens guaranteed at least a share of the Macomb Area Conference Gold Division championship.

Lincoln closed out its league schedule 10-2. The Abes are 15-4 overall. Both Warren-Mott and Marysville were 9-2 entering play last night. They still have to play one another.

### Boys Basketball

This is Lincoln's second year in the Gold Division. The Abes finished second last year. It was only a few years ago when they won back-to-back Silver Division championships.

"This was good," said McGavin. "We've had some ups and downs this season. We beat Mott, and then we dropped a game at Marysville that dropped us out of first place. Then Mott beat Marysville the other day. This was our last league game tonight."

Lincoln jumped out to an 18-11 lead in the first quarter last night, and went up 36-22 at halftime.

Anthony Williams led the Abes with 23 points. He hit eight of nine free throws in the second half. Lincoln knocked down 28 of 34 from the foul line. Tremaris Campbell scored 10 and grabbed seven rebounds. Charles Spann scored 15, as did Romenta Pope.

Mount Clemens was led by Cedric Powell, who scored 15.

Lincoln travels to Warren Woods-Tower for a MAC crossover contest Tuesday.

## Seniors spark Clintondale to another title

There's no question that Clintondale seniors James Bethea, Cordero Gaines and Denzel Rodgers made significant contributions on the court to the Dragons' second straight Macomb Area Conference Silver Division championship.

All one has to do is look at the combined 41 points the three returning players scored in Clintondale's 72-65 victory Thursday against a scrappy Center Line team.

However, Bethea, Gaines and Rodgers did even more than that.

### Boys Basketball

"They taught our younger players what it takes to win a championship," said Dragons coach Rob Townsend.

"There were some times when they questioned whether they wanted to work as hard as they did, but the seniors knew what it took to win it, what effort had to be there.

"There were some practices that we didn't give that effort and it resulted in a loss the next game. The seniors showed what had to be done to get there and eventually they all decided that's what they wanted to do."

Nine of Clintondale's 13 players were members of the football team that also won a division title and Townsend said that helped establish a winning attitude that carried over to the basketball season.

Thursday's victory gave Clintondale an 11-3 division record and assured them of nothing worse than a tie for the championship, depending on Lake Shore's game with Lamphere.

A loss to Lamphere earlier this week, led to some soul-searching for Townsend and his team.

"After losing to Lamphere we had a talk about our roles and re-establish-

ing our goals," Townsend said. "They really came out today determined, and everybody who played took care of what they had to."

Bethea was certainly ready to go. He scored 10 of his 23 points in the first quarter to help Clintondale get off to a good start, and he had four points during a decisive 11-0 run late in the second quarter.

"Everybody as a team had to step up," said Bethea, who also collected 11 rebounds and six assists. "This was a championship game. We didn't want to be in second place.

"It feels good to win it two years in a row. But it's a lot of hard work."

Gaines stepped up a couple of times in the second half when Center Line started to rally from its 34-22 halftime deficit.

He and Anthony Brownlee hit consecutive 3-point baskets late in the third quarter to give the Dragons their biggest lead of the game, 46-31, after the Panthers had sliced the margin to nine.

Center Line continued to battle back behind the scoring of Eric Stevens, who had a game-high 26 points, and Derrick Popov and Clarence Alford, who finished with 14 and 12 points, respectively.

After a basket by Alford cut the Clintondale lead to 59-52 with 3:41 to go, Gaines answered with another 3-pointer to put the Dragons back in front by 10. Four straight baskets by Popov and a pair of free throws by Alford made it 68-65 with 10 seconds to go.

Once again, Gaines came through with an important basket to clinch the victory. He scored on a hard drive to the hoop and was fouled. He missed the free throw but Rodgers grabbed the rebound and put the finishing touch on the Clintondale victory.

"You've got to do what you've got to do," Gaines said. "We needed that basket. The only thing on our minds

was to win this game. There was nothing else to it. We've got to finish in first."

Center Line coach Jim Nelson was proud of his team's effort.

"My kids have played much tougher the last couple of weeks," he said. "I'm proud of them for fighting back. Clintondale is a big, physical team, but we said at halftime, 'Let's take the fight to them.' That's what we did and we got back into the game.

"I was a little concerned about that 11-0 run at the half. We can't keep digging all those holes, but I think we'll be OK."

The Panthers still don't have the injured Jonathon Essenmacher back in the lineup. Nelson is hopeful that he'll return in time for the state tournament, but he isn't sure.

"He's averaging 20 points a game," Nelson said. "Having him could make these games a lot different."

Bethea's 23-point effort was his seventh straight game of 20 points or more and it left him only 16 short of 1,000 career points.

"The kid works harder than anybody else," Townsend said. "He's the best rebounder. He's a good passer and obviously, he's a great offensive threat. We don't win two league championships without him but you need a supporting cast and those guys came through."

Clintondale has also suffered injuries and illness during the season, but the adversity has made the Dragons a better team.

"This is the first time in a while that we've had our full lineup,"

Townsend said. "When you have that, you get depth. Tonight we had a lot of people in foul trouble, but when somebody had to come out, somebody replaced them and did just as good a job.

"If somebody gets tired, we have somebody to step in and the level doesn't drop off. That's a compliment to the whole team and to the juniors who get to do this next year when it's their team."

Brownlee finished with 14 points,

eight rebounds and four assists for Clintondale, while Gaines collected 12 points and seven rebounds and Le-terrius Walton had four blocked shots.

In addition to his 26 points, Center Line's Stevens had 10 rebounds and five assists. Popov also dished out five assists.

top teams in the division. St. Clair Shores lost by just a goal to Rochester; the Lakers dismantled Eisenhower earlier in the season. Ike will need a dominant performance from senior forward Joe Warner — and stellar goaltending — if it is to pull off the upset.

**Troy Athens vs. Stevenson; Troy vs. Beverly Hills Groves**

What a year this has been for Stevenson. The Titans somehow wound up in third place in the MAC White, despite being the only county team to go undefeated in division play. Five ties landed them behind L'Anse Creuse North and Eisenhower in the White. Nobody, however, had a better overall record than Stevenson. As of today, the Titans are 15-3-5 overall. They have not lost a game in nearly two months — earning a point in 13 consecutive contests. As fate would have it, Stevenson's first-round opponent is Troy Athens — which eliminated the Titans in the second round last season. One of only four MAC teams to top 100 goals scored, there is a very good chance that Stevenson and forwards Dan Dougherty and Fred DeMarti will capture the school's first regional title.

**At St. Clair Shores Civic, March 2, 4**

**St. Clair Shores vs. Warren-Sterling United; U of D Jesuit vs. Grosse Pointe North**

Unfortunately for the winner between St. Clair Shores and Warren-Sterling, that team will face a top-10 state-ranked opponent in the second round. As the Lakers know all too well, their

pre-regional tournament draw is a brutal one. In both 2006 and '07, GPN ousted Shores from the playoffs — returning the favor after the Lakers' win in '05. SCS turned in what by its standards could be called a decent season this year, finishing runner-up in the MAC Red and 11-6-5 overall with one regular-season game remaining. The Lakers have outstanding talent, such as Chris Pontello, Cory Shafer and Joe Rutkowski. It has been an up-and-down season for Warren-Sterling. The Thunder certainly has players who can score — Kenny Miller and Matt Reno come to mind — but they are otherwise a very young team. Two sophomore goalies and just six seniors will prove too much against a veteran team like Shores. The Thunder finished fifth in the White and was 10-10-3 overall at press time.

**Ford vs. Utica; Winner of Game 1 vs. Dakota**

The Cougars have been tough to figure out this season. Many games, they appear the MAC's best team — fitting, since they won the Red Division for the second consecutive year. They have struggled, however, with many non-MAC opponents. From a statistical standpoint, the Cougars are a top-three defensive team in the conference, thanks to the goaltending duo of Spencer Gold and Peter Tropper. With scorers aplenty and solid defense, Dakota appears built for another long playoff run and perhaps a second straight regional championship. It is déjà vu all over again for Utica. The Chieftains have faced Dakota in every single post-season since the inception of the MAC in 2005. Utica boasts a 3-1 post-season record against the Cougars, after losing last season.

While it is not a given that Utica will top Ford, the Chieftains beat the Falcons by five goals in the Challenge Cup Tournament. Utica spent the year decimated by injuries and still managed a third-place finish in the Red and 8-10-4 record as of today. The burden to score this post-season will fall on senior Nick Drenchko, who is unlikely to disappoint. Ford finished second to Marysville in the Blue Division, but was one of the worst teams in the conference defensively. Freshman goalie Alex Stickney has been impressive all season, but will need to be downright brilliant for Ford to advance. The team also will need an other-worldly game from Kyle Hautala up front. The Falcons were 6-12-4 with a game remaining.

**At Suburban Macomb, March 2, 4**

**Anchor Bay vs. Rochester Hills Stoney Creek; Port Huron vs. Romeo**

Anchor Bay will not have to wait long for a shot at redemption. The Tars were ousted last season by Stoney Creek in the second round. The bad news is that Stoney Creek is coming off another outstanding season. The Tars had a rough go of it in the Red Division this season, finishing fourth. Struggling to score most of the year, Anchor Bay was in the bottom three in the conference on offense. Still, the team played very well against top competition, hanging in with Dakota and even taking a point off of St. Clair Shores. A roster comprised of extremely young defensemen and only a handful of seniors will struggle to pull off the upset. It will be on senior forwards James Mackey and Brett Knybel to provide the spark for the Tars, who were 7-12-2 before Wednesday's game. Romeo, meanwhile, should have no problem with Port Huron. The

Bulldogs finished fourth in the MAC White and were 9-10-3 overall with one game to go. Up front, Romeo is led by a pair of dynamic junior forwards in Zack Soulliere and Brad Rice. Always a dependable forward, Soulliere enjoyed a breakout season offensively — eclipsing the 20-goal mark. The Bulldogs will need defenseman Billy Turner to move the puck up quickly if they are to get their own shot at knocking out Stoney Creek — which eliminated Romeo last year.

**At Fraser, March 2, 4**  
**Fraser vs. L'Anse Creuse North; Winner of Game 1 vs. L'Anse Creuse**

Pre-regionals do not get much easier to predict than this. It is very tough to argue with the brilliant play L'Anse Creuse North has shown all year. The Crusaders won the White Division for the first time in school history and boasted the county's best offense by a long shot. Senior forwards Nick West and Chris Davis compiled ridiculous offensive numbers — combining for over 60 goals and 110 points. Factor in fellow senior Taylor Tyll's point-per-game clip and it becomes clear why LCN was 16-6-1 overall with one game to go. Fraser, on the other hand, struggled for most of its inaugural season. Mike Kohler, Justin Coppola and Jason Emoett all were able to break double digits in goals, but the Ramblers had a lot of difficulty keeping the puck out of the net. Fraser was 5-16-1 with one game left. L'Anse Creuse went through its worst season in school history, finishing last in the White and are 6-14-1 with a game left. Only Fraser gave up more goals than L'Anse Creuse in the county. The good news for the Lancers is that 16 players on the current team will be eligible to return next season, so they can use this post-season to gain

valuable experience.

**at Detroit City Arena, March 2, 4**

**De La Salle vs. Warren-Mott; Winner of Game 1 vs. Grosse Pointe South**

With all due respect to Warren-Mott, this pre-regional is between De La Salle and Grosse Pointe South. De La Salle captured a regional championship last season, defeating Grosse Pointe South 1-0 in double overtime. The Pilots bowed out to Trenton, the eventual state champion in Division 2. As usual, De La Salle has a powerful offense and stingy defense. They also boast John Kleinhans — arguably the best goalie in the state — who spurned offers to play junior hockey in order to finish his high school career with the Pilots. At 13-7-2 overall with a pair of games yet to play, De La Salle has shown the game-by-game consistency to consider itself a legitimate contender for the Division 2 state title. Of course, that means getting past GPS — who the Pilots peppered with over 40 shots in early January before skating away with only a 2-2 tie to show for it. With Steve Vandenberghe patrolling the blue line and Bill Coole causing havoc up front, De La Salle appears to have all the pieces in place. Warren-Mott struggled this season — 3-12-0 overall with a game to go — and finished behind Fraser in last place in the Blue Division. If there is a silver lining for the year, it is the make-up of the roster. The team features more sophomores than seniors. Three of its defensemen are ninth-graders. It took on the challenge of playing two crossover games against Eisenhower. While this season may have been tough, at least next year looks brighter for the Marauders.
